You left home and went abroad to earn a living. You 'happen' to encounter someone who is willing to 'help' you. They told you they would get you a visa and a travel document. For free. They know someone who will take you across the border, and some else who will wait for you on the other side. They told you to keep quiet if anything goes wrong at the border crossing or if the police happen to stop you. Of course, you will have to sleep somewhere. Where? You don't know. They say that you will work for their friends and be decently paid. Is this work in a bar? In a massage salon? In an apartment or workshop? On a building site? On a farm? Or in the streets, where you will have to beg for money or play an instrument?

Although you don't understand the language, this is no problem; you will learn it quickly. They may even introduce you to your future husband or wife. Are you going to Slovenia?

- IS EVERYTHING GOING AS YOU AGREED?
- DO YOU KNOW WHO YOUR EMPLOYER WILL BE AND HOW MUCH YOU WILL EARN?
- WHAT ABOUT AN EMPLOYMENT CONTRACT?
- ARE YOU ENTITLED TO DAYS OFF, SICK LEAVE, WORK FOR A MAXIMUM OF 8 HOURS PER DAY?
- DO YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO CHOOSE AND THE RIGHT TO SAY 'NO'?
- CAN YOU CHANGE YOUR MIND AND LEAVE IMMEDIATELY?

DEMAND ANSWERS TO THESE QUESTIONS BEFORE YOU LEAVE!



Human trafficking is illegal and means treating people as objects. In Slovenia, human trafficking is a serious criminal offence.

Forms of exploitation: forced prostitution or other forms of sexual abuse, forced labour, slavery, servitude, begging, forced crimes, forced marriages or similar partnership, and trafficking in organs, tissue and blood.

Traffickers use physical, psychological, economic and sexual violence. Through fraud and emotional distortion, they take advantage of your vulnerability when you need help, or they offer you payment and benefits if you consent to exploitation.

SELF-PROTECTION MEASURES

- **TRAVELING:** Tell at least one other person when, where and with whom you are travelling. Have your mobile phone with you and do not forget to save important telephone numbers: the embassy of your home country, the police and organisations that offer help. Even better, memorise these numbers. Do not give your travel document to anyone. Additionally, have several photocopies of important documents and keep them in different garments.
- **WORK ABROAD:** Be careful about your source of information about potential employment abroad. Find details about the employer and check the information on the Internet. Before starting any job, make an agreement on the working conditions and demand a contract, which should be checked by an expert – you can even call the Ključ Association.
- **SOCIAL MEDIA:** Don't forget that social media allow anonymous communication, and that some people you might encounter on social media do not tell the truth. If you arrange to meet someone in person, be very careful.
- **FALLING IN LOVE:** In Slovenia and around the world, some men in criminal networks play crucial roles as lover boys seducing women and girls, only to hand them over later to human traffickers. If a man has a lot of money and connections abroad, but does not have a regular job, think about it. These men seem kind; they might buy a woman presents, take her on trips or shopping abroad, so that she becomes emotionally attached and completely trusts them. This is the perfect opportunity for them to take the woman somewhere and sell her.
